

With his or her application, each participant transfers all of his or her image and audio rights in connection with the competition to its organisers. All jury choices are final and non-disputable. If the maximum performance duration for each round (12 minutes for the first round, 30 minutes for the second round) is exceeded, the jury will stop the performance at any time.

The duration of each performance starts with its first note, and ends with the cessation of the last note of said performance. Every participant is allowed to play his or her programme either by heart or from a musical score, according to personal preference. For each round of the competition, participants must bring one copy of the scores of the works that will be played to be given to the jury. Every participant's programme needs to be distinct for both rounds, and no two identical pieces in any given programme are allowed.
