



May 2025


Well, where did all that rain go? It seems the days of moderation are behind us. After what must be one of the driest and warmest Springs in decades we are ready to bound into June and ought to be prepared for further exceptions in the weather. The warmth has helped our local hedgerows to prosper and surely a pre-regatta trim beckons?

Your councillors were delighted to see an extended turnout at May's council meeting and further motivated by additional, very welcome, attendees joining for the Annual Parish Meeting.

The evening gave us the opportunity to pay tribute to Sarah West whose recent death had saddened all who knew her. We recognised that Sarah had previously been a very active and robust Chair of the Parish Council. She was frequently noted for her ability to connect directly and persuasively with any organisation or individual where a change of behaviour on their part was deemed likely to be beneficial to the Parish.

Not that any agenda items are mundane in RPC but we did take action on the perpetual challenge of having sufficient bins to accommodate the volumes of dog waste bags requiring disposal. Two larger bins have been procured, and we should collectively ensure all dog walkers are reminded to deposit their bags safely.

The meeting discussed a number of Highways related matters. Where credit is due we give it. It was noted that WBC Highways had responded with alacrity to a notification of tarmac 'surf' on the A4130 and said surf

Lockdown Lodge is returning to its position next to Hambledon Lock for the summer and the meeting noted the positive ratings given by many users of the Lodge. RPC deputy Chair, Polly, has met with the founder of the lodge and passed on our support for the coming season.

At last the Environment agency are active in the approval process for the planned Ferry Lane slipway refurbishment. Our chosen contractor can then schedule the work, hopefully whilst the river is low.

The meeting also received an update presentation from Adam Toop. Adam is the founder / sponsor of the new Vintage boat museum currently being built in the old Hobbs boatyard site off the Wargrave road. The meeting agreed this was a welcome and notable addition to our Parish.



So, in summary, your Parish Council keeps itself busy on your behalf, dear Parishioners. Do keep us on our toes with timely and polite nudges if you need us to do more....particularly if these can be balanced with an occasional 'Well Done', for the benefit of morale all round!

LETTER FROM RON EMERSON TO THE HENLEY STANDARD

"The article by Nathaniel Lawson in the Standard regarding a license application by Remenham Club needs to be put into context with some facts that many Standard readers will not be aware of.

Over recent years there has been an almost aggressive increase in events held in Remenham, such that there are now more that 150 days of event activity in this rural parish every year. This may surprise people when looking at the event days held, but the major component here is the set up and take down time for events which causes most of the disruption, with giant articulated lorries trying to negotiate single track roads. This frequently leads to access being denied the homes of local residents and it has been pointed out many times that emergency vehicles would not be able to access properties on many occasions. It is not merely inconvenient, it is dangerous.

It also leads to environmental damage: only one example is that two trees had to be cut down in Remenham Lane to allow a huge vehicle to get through. Only two weeks ago the RunThroughHenley event, which in fact is a run through Remenham event, involved a one mile traffic jam on Remenham Lane. Last year the jam was on Church Lane such that I had to park on Remenham Hill and walk one mile to get home. This not only compromises what is everyone's legal right to 'the quite enjoyment of their homes' but also the legal right to access them!

What is notable about these events is that all of them are labelled as 'Henley' events, yet none are held in Henley. As a consequence, Henley gets all of the kudos and economic benefits, while Remenham has all of the cost and disruption No one in Henley would put up with this. It's worth casting minds back a few years when there was a major cycling event held in Henley which involved some temporary and minor road closures in the area. There was an outcry from Henley residents and the event was cancelled - one event.

It is because of this constant progression of new and extended events that Wokingham Borough Council is looking at the possible need for a Cumulative Impact Policy and, as a precursor to this, will be conducting a Cumulative Impact Assessment this year in Remenham. Such a policy, if approved, would introduce the need to assess any new license application to be viewed in the context of whether it was additive to current activities. In that sense Mr Paul Francis, the applicant in this case, may look on his request as trivial, but this is how it has all gone so badly; it's lots of often small things that have led to a rural parish, utterly unsuited to the level of current activities, and served as it is by single track roads, to be compromised and damaged by nothing more than profit motives. It's what typically is called 'the boiling frog syndrome'. Any neutral party looking at what this accumulation of events has led to would be appalled.

And, finally, in addition to the activity listed above, we have a population the size of Coventry or Swansea, more than Newcastle, who descend on Remenham every year as a result of these events that, together, has created a gigantic carbon footprint in Remenham, all in the name of Henley. Does anyone care about this in a time of climate emergency, when there are huge efforts going on to reduce carbon emissions? Worth a thought."

I am sure that we all recognised the Sally-Anne who was such a prominent member of our Remenham Community! *Felicity Rutland, Editor*

18th March 2025

"First of all, on behalf of Charles, Edward and myself, I would like to express our sincere thanks to all of you for being here today, supporting us and remembering our wonderful mother, Sally-Anne. We would also like to thank, very specifically, all of the amazing medical staff and carers at the John Radcliffe Hospital, the Didcot Community Hospital, the Oxford City Community Hospital and at Chilterns Court here in Henley, for their kindness and compassion, sympathy and endless patience in the face of growing uncertainty and inevitability.

However we remember her - as sister, mother, mother-in-law, grandmother, aunt, cousin or as a friend, she touched so many lives and has left her mark in so many ways. It is important not to let the turmoil of her last 8 weeks detract from the wonderful memories that we have individually or share collectively.

Entertaining: It has been so heartening to read the many messages that frequently note common themes – very often referring to parties, dinners and general entertainment of which both she and our wonderful father, Nick, were noted as "always doing so well" with added comments such as:

"Kind and sympathetic", "Warmest of welcomes", "Magnificent hospitality", "Delicious food and a ceaseless flow of distinguished libations" (thank you Tim for that particular eloquence).

As many of you will attest, as a couple, they loved a party, particularly if dancing was involved.

Whilst many memories are triggered by different senses, as children we knew when a proper party was in the offing – particularly with mother's preparations. The distinctive warm electrical smell of Carmen rollers heating on the dressing table; the aromatic waft of Elnett hair spray; the pull of the Mason and Pearson hairbrush completing the hair-do, and a spritz or two of Caleche perfume completed the scene.

Whether hosting an elaborate and generous picnic at Henley Regatta, an intimate dinner party around the table with cut glass and bone china, welcoming boisterous groups of young and "less young" into the marquee during our 21st birthday celebrations, throwing open the doors at Remenham Club for signature birthdays and anniversaries, or their final big bash at Phyllis Court celebrating their Diamond Wedding Anniversary in October 2022 – generosity and the sharing of good times and celebrations were important to them both.

Service to the community: In reflecting on how she shared her time and energy, our mother lived a life full of involvement, keeping busy and generous community service.

Having moved back from Australia to Harpsden in 1978, she immediately volunteered with the Cancer Sale at the Henley Town Hall and helped with the organisation of the annual All Ages Ball hosted at Phyllis Court and then at Fawley Court. From selling Christmas cards in Christ Church Centre to more than 25 years helping in the Oxfam bookshop in Henley, for which she received a well-deserved certificate acknowledging her long service and enduring commitment, her dedication to rolling her sleeves up, getting stuck in and helping others has been evident for so long and will be sorely missed by so many.

When they moved from Harpsden to Remenham in 1987, the church flower rota, the church hall, the annual fete and the acclaimed Remenham Thespians provided new calls for her talents and love of social activities. As much as she was a great organiser, her desire to be an active participant never left her. Whether submitting a prize-winning bloom from a favourite rose bush or taking a lead role in a theatrical production, her preparation, planning and commitment to the task at hand were clear for all to see. It is lovely to know that, despite her failing health, she was still intent on taking part in the "Letters Evening" at the end of March.

Even during her last weeks, this "thinking of others" was exemplified by her chief concerns of getting birthday cards sent to friends, planning a family lunch at Phyllis Court, getting back to the book shop and keeping an annual reunion with fellow Alumni of Oakdene School.

As a grandmother: Becoming a grandmother in 1996 unleashed a new level of energy. Her love of roses was beautifully expressed, with a new specimen being bought from David Austin upon the arrival of each grandchild. Along with similar examples to commemorate landmark birthdays and wedding anniversaries, their gardens at Remenham and Ravenscroft Road were a testament to the importance of marking significant life events in both colour and fragrance.

Throughout her life, mother was a keen consumer of "gentle" media. Alongside a staple diet of BBC Radio 2 and the dulcet "golden era" tones of Terry Wogan, Ken Bruce and David Jacobs, she had a compelling interest in murder mysteries — as long as the violence was unseen and the cases were investigated by Morse, Miss Marple or Hercule Poirot.

Even during our formative years living in Australia, we might have been forgiven for thinking that everyone in England lived in a world of Upstairs Downstairs, The Duchess of Duke Street or The Pallisers.


As an avid reader, volunteering in the Oxfam bookshop was akin to Charlie Bucket getting a golden ticket to Willy Wonka's Chocolate Factory – surrounded as she was by titles old and new, pulp fiction to collectables and children's classics as well as a range of specialist themes that fed her interests and discussions with us all, in particular about cookery, gardening, creative crafts and different countries that we had visited.

As a couple, moving to Ravencroft Road in 2012 brought them close to where their life together started in Kings Close, 50 years earlier. The move also seemed to supercharge their zest for life, seeing new friendships made with so many wonder neighbours and a greater amount of socialising that kept their minds active and spirits uplifted. It was the perfect place for their latter years together.

Ending: As we were reminded many times during her last two months, "I'm 83 and I've had a good life."

And finally, we hope, above all, that you will enjoy your evening as much as we shall enjoy sharing these letters with you!"










REVIEW BY GEOFF GOODWIN

Pascal's talk was very informative and interesting with some humorous anecdotes of visits to homes and families in the area.


During tea, several members asked Pascal to look at a few items of jewellery and family heirlooms which they had brought along, with questions as to the ages and values of their pieces.


Several members met recently for lunch at The Shire Horse, to enjoy lunch and to exchange all the latest news and to enjoy a relaxing chat.
