No newsletter would be complete without a polite request to residents to ask them to show consideration to their neighbours and the wider population of Elsea Park.

There have been three issues that have attracted complaints over the summer, one being the continued blocking of pavements by motorists which forces pedestrians into the roads. This is particularly difficult for those pushing buggies, in wheelchairs, or on mobility scooters and is a real danger to anyone with a visual impairment. In the future (when the roads are finally adopted) some drivers may get a polite visit from Bourne Police, or even receive fixed penalty notices. On several occasions, refuse collection and delivery vehicles have been unable to gain access to some areas, causing missed collections and failed deliveries.

The second issue has been groups of children playing (and at times causing a nuisance) in some of the car parks and private drives that can be found scattered across the development. These areas are provided for the sole use of the people who own them, and everyone else should keep out! There are abundant play parks and public open spaces throughout Elsea Park, so please encourage your children to make use of them.

Finally, residents are reminded that there is a restriction on the title of all properties within the development by which owners agreed not to park or permit to be parked any caravan, trailer, boat or yacht on their property unless the same is in a fully screened location previously approved in writing by the transferor.
