**Event Secretary -**

keeping it wheel

Before we set off with Roy & Sonia to East Anglia to explore the area on our way to the MGA Register's Spring tour from Bury St Edmunds, with help from Neil and Roy we concluded a new wiper motor was needed for my MGA. Sadly, it wouldn't arrive before we set off on the long drive to King's Lynn, so we just had to put up with wipers that didn't have the power to park properly. If only that was the only problem. (PS When the new wiper did arrive from Moss, guess what? To cut a very long story short they had sent one that didn't have the wiper park feature. I had to get a refund and order again from SC Parts)

First, after a quick visit to Great Yarmouth (quick was plenty long enough!) my car's ignition warning light wouldn't go off. The alternator was just 4 years old but, after testing, an AA man confirmed what we knew already - that it had stopped working. Consulting the MGOC website of MG specialist garages, I found details of a chap nearby who said he could drop what he was currently working on, and also get a new alternator delivered from his supplier that very morning. However, he had moved from the address MGOC quoted in Thetford and was now an hour and a half drive away, back near Kings Lynn. On arrival, rather than what was supposed to be a direct swap, the 'correct' new replacement alternator didn't quite fit. To get all the fan belt pulleys lined up, the mechanic needed to grind the brackets down a bit. So, a half-hour job turned into an hour and a half faff. Still, I was grateful to have found a Samaritan to fix the problem at short notice.

Then the rattle started. By rattle I don't mean an occasional squeak. This was a horrible, loud, bag of nails inside a cement mixer cacophony. It was so loud Roy could hear it driving behind me. First guess was a broken exhaust mount. The exhaust pipe on my car has always been worryingly low slung and I knew, and Roy had seen, that we had grounded on a particularly bad country road. We peered underneath and noticed one of the exhaust brackets had broken. A chap saw me with the bonnet up in the car park at a B&Q and offered to run me to Halfords to get a new bracket and stand by with spare tools should they be needed while I fixed it. He was Samaritan number two.

However, that turned out not to be the cause of the rattle, which continued and was by now flummoxing us, not least because that exhaust issue had focussed our attention in the wrong direction. We drove to Cottenham, near Cambridge, where my daughter lives. This is not far from MGOC HQ at Swavesey, and I called the workshop to ask if we could put the car up on a lift to see where the rattle was coming from. As I was 300 miles from home, they took pity and said they too would stop what they were doing to take a quick look. It turned out to be the retaining rod that secures a clip holding the front disc pads in place. It was badly bent allowing the pads to slip and grind but fortunately MGOC's huge spares department was next door and so parts were quickly sourced and fitted. I already carry replacement clips, but as this was the second time this had happened I was happy to get new ones and keep my spares in the boot just in case. The MGOC mechanic was Samaritan number 3.

Next day, and you couldn't make this stuff up, Roy's ignition light stayed on! He too took himself to Swavesey and once again Samaritan 3 fitted a new alternator from off the shelf next door. It later turned out to be just an earthing problem with the ignition light, so Roy now has a spare alternator. He had also broken a tail light and had lost a radiator cap, so these were also replaced from the Spares Department. But what about our East Anglian trip and the MGA Register weekend? How was that? Well, it was lovely to explore an unfamiliar area. Though the flat northern coast is a bit of a disappointment compared to our dramatic Westcountry beaches and cliffs, inland it's lovely; imagine the Cotswolds but without the crowds. We visited some historic sites including the Anglo-Saxon replica village at South Wold, and Sutton Hoo, the burial site of King Raedwald, who died around 625. The huge privately owned Caister Castle Car Collection was also well worth a visit.

It was great to see a whole fleet of MGAs gathered at our hotel in Bury St Edmunds. Roy & Sonia beat Jan & me by just 5 miles to win the furthest travelled award. They were given a gimungous jar of Branston Pickle, which is made nearby, and together with the smaller jar that they also won in the raffle, it should keep them pickled for a while. I hope they relish it. Boom Boom!

# **News snippets**

#### Sad news as the Moretonhampstead Motor Museum announces its closure

Frank Loft, owner of the Moretonhampstead Motor Museum which is housed in a 1930s art deco style former bus depot within the Dartmoor National Park, posted this on the Museum's Facebook page:

It is with some regret that I have taken the decision to sell the museum and retire from my 'retirement project'. This has been a difficult and emotive decision to make. I hope that someone with a similar level of passion and drive will take this 'project' on and continue to develop and curate the collection well into the future. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have contributed to the success of the project along the way and to all who have enjoyed visiting.

Whatever happens, the museum will remain open to visitors until at least the end of August.



If a new custodian is not forthcoming by mid-July, then it is likely the collection will be auctioned later this year.

#### **Car Insurance problems**

Safety Fast! recently caried a report on classic car drivers either being stopped by the Police or receiving letters from them saying that their car has been caught being driven without insurance, even when they were in fact fully covered. The consequences of driving an uninsured car are very serious. In these cases, the cars had not appeared in the MID (Motor Insurance Database) as having current insurance due to an admin problem.

One owner reported that after sending his insurance certificate and bank statement proving the policy had been paid for to the Police station that picked up the issue, a Sergent called to explain the issue. First he advised the owner to immediately stop driving the car as, although it was insured, their system reported otherwise. He advised keeping the car off the road until the insurance company updated the owner's insurance details on MID.

So, what's to be done to stop you from being pulled over and threatened with dire consequences? Firstly, enter your car's registration number onto the MID website here: <u>https://askmid.com/</u>

My MGA is registered as being insured. If yours is not, stop using it and contact your insurance company urgently to get them to update their records immediately. Afterwards, please tell me how you got on sorting it all out.

Secondly, it's a good idea to carry your insurance details with you at all times. Having the documents stored on your phone is fine.

FYI the Police take an uninsured car off the road every three and a half minutes!

# The MG100 Cavalcade began on April 30th at John O Groats and ended at Lands End on May 25th 2024

For me, this Rally heralds the beginning of the classic car season, and I have reported on it many times since 2003. The journey to Plusha Bridge, near Launceston on the A30, was obviously familiar and the late Spring growth ensured a pleasurable, green, escapist drive, through villages with unlikely Cornish names as Bray Shop, Coads Green and Congdons Shop. After a brief flirtation with the infamous dual carriageway, the first slip road took me under the road at Trewint and back again following the old London Road (part of the newly named Trafalgar Way) to the Rally site 200 yards away.

Initially my heart stopped when confronted with the entrance. A sea of mud greeted me; acres of it! On reflection I should not have been surprised as, before I left home, during a phone call to Roger Grace, he warned of the likely conditions, as he had taken his everyday car there two days previously and mentioned heavy showers both on the Bank Holiday Saturday and Sunday; Monday should be the best day!!

Back to the mud. The main gate sentry said, "You're welcome to try it sir, at your own risk. It gets better the further you go in".

I eyed a couple of gleaming abandoned classic cars parked on the road outside, and another behind me who immediately performed a 'Uee' and went home. I decided to be a man of decision and went for it! Amazingly the Magnette is quite good in mud, provided it has momentum. I attempted to skirt the sea of goo using what little grass was left near some tents, regardless of plucking out a few strategic guys and pegs on the way. I literally ploughed on, eventually reaching some virgin grass. Surprisingly there was a large assembly of classic cars there already, with club member Andy Slapp attempting to wash the mud from his pristine RV8 with a litre bottle of drinking water. Obligingly he had left ample space for me alongside, overlooking the main ring.

The sun was shining quite bravely by this time, but we could see shower clouds lining up in the West. This gave Andy a further dilemma: put his hood up and down in rhythm with the showers, or alternatively protect the cockpit and stylish interior with a large MG umbrella. The umbrella won - just (see photo)

The weather had a marked effect on the displays. No traction engines were allowed to move, sulking 'in-steam' in a corner of the field. No classic tractor races were run other than who could be <u>the slowest</u> over 100 yds. You could eat two ice cream cones end to end whilst that event took place. The displays that benefitted from the restrictions were those involving animals, people, and children. A family of llamas strutted their stuff regularly around the arena. I'm now an expert on the species, having heard the commentary four times. Shire horses too enjoyed being the centre of attraction. Relieved of the plough, they behaved like kids' show ponies, to say nothing of the all-female drummer band, definitely an acquired taste!

Sadly, the whole show was subdued this year, but eventually the sun came out permanently and, in true British spirit, punters made the best of it, particularly viewing the 50-odd classic cars on parade. "I passed my test in a Magnette nearly 60 year ago," a regular opening gambit.

The final challenge at the end of the day was exiting the 25-acre field unscathed. Andy and I chose to use the natural slope in an attempt to find an alternative un-muddy gateway. We managed in the end, after several three-point turns, to circumnavigate the whole site back to the A30. Andy expressed his relief by giving his V8 engine the full wellie treatment to Mac 2, as he headed East, passed me in a 'blurrrr!', and home.
