As I'd like to thin out my club duties a little, I recently proposed to the committee that the current Event Secretary role be split, and a new position of Social Secretary created. This was agreed in principle and Janis volunteered to take it on.

Currently as Event Sec. I am responsible for two distinct types of event by:

- Monitoring and helping with the organisation of our monthly club lunches, etc.
- Gathering and providing information via newsletter, email and our website, concerning the shows and runs put on by our own and various other organisations.

The proposal is to split these two tasks between the Event Secretary and Social Secretary. This seems an easy and comfortable divide, as our monthly club runs are very much social affairs and different from 'outside' events.

So you will be asked to agree to this proposal to create a...

<u>Social Secretary</u>. Responsible for planning the activity programme for Club Meetings. Support and advise members conducting monthly runs. Social activity such as the Christmas Dinner.

For those organising club events, Janis as Social Sec. would provide pro forma lists for names of participants to be gathered. It is to her, together with the organisers, that members should direct any queries, not the Event Sec.

The Social Sec. will also make available the start time and place of each event so that this information can be published in newsletters and on the club's website under the Entry forms/details tab.

So all that is to be agreed by the membership. However, Janis is already overseeing the organisers of the February and March Sunday lunch runs in my absence.

Any queries about these should be directed to Janis, John & Bee (Feb) or Nigel & Naomi (March).

Regarding our biennial (meaning once every two years) People & Places run, each time a subcommittee will be formed to specifically organise this stand-alone event mostly, though not necessarily exclusively, comprised from the committee.



The award of the Irene Williamson Trophy for the Best Club Run of the Year went to Bill &Sue. Voted for by the club membership, we all enjoyed their run to the Jubilee Inn, Pelynt. Sadly, Sue & Bill weren't able to take part themselves on the day as they were both unwell, but they were thanked in absentia. We were delighted they felt well enough to come to the January club meeting where they were surprised to hear they had won this award. It was great to see them again.

I had been encouraging members to take photos of their cars to enter into the club photography competition. I wasn't overwhelmed with entry numbers but was delighted by each and every one that was submitted, and I displayed them on the giant TV screen.



I had set myself up as judge and jury because a) it was my idea, and b) I wanted committee members to be able to enter as well. Throughout my life, although I don't consider myself to be a particularly talented or prolific photographer, I have always been around cameras of different kinds both privately and for my work. I have learned a lot, so knew what I was looking for. With an open mind as to what might constitute a winner I decided to create award categories around what had been submitted rather than be prescriptive in advance.

The first award was Best Car Portrait. Here I was looking for something that could grace the cover of Enjoying MG! and felt Richard's photo fitted the bill perfectly. It was colourful, well-lit and showcased his shiny car to perfection. Notice also how the scorched grass acts as a reflector to fill and lighten in the back-lit GT's side shadow and chrome wheels.

Many of Richard's excellent photos showed his car from the rear, but for this purpose I felt that, to be a 'cover girl', a frontal view was required.





I decided Gavin's MGCGT towing his glider should win the Best Car Out & About award. Here's his MGC with its mighty 3ltr engine being put to good use. This picture could have been used as an advert to sell these cars. It suggests freedom of the road, freedom of the sky, and power.



The composition draws the eye from one side of the image to the other to a distant vanishing point. Smashing.





Finally, we came to the overall winner of the Tamar Valley MGOC Photography Competition 2022. Taken by Simon of their RV8, it has everything I was looking for – beauty, light and an original viewpoint. Serious photography forces you to look more closely at an object and its surroundings - light, shape and form, colour, texture, composition and, dare I say it, artistry. I wanted an image that revealed that the photographer has seen something in a moment that perhaps no-one else spotted and I think this, overleaf, did. It's a photo I wish I'd taken myself.



I was delighted that this competition went well with really impressive entries. Thanks to all who entered. The consensus at the meeting was that we should do it again this year, so I'll plan to launch another competition in April.


